Introduction

Sexual Health Centre Lunenburg County (SHCLC) is a registered, not-for-profit serving both Lunenburg and Queens Counties on the South Shore of Nova Scotia.

Our mission is to promote sexual and reproductive health throughout the lifespan by providing information, education, and services, and encouraging informed, responsible attitudes toward sexuality.

We offer a number of core services:

- Education workshops
- Outreach
- Pregnancy testing and options guidance
- Free or low cost health supplies like condoms, dams, and lube
- Individual guidance or peer counselling
- Resources including website and lending library

We are a member-centre of Sexual Health Nova Scotia, which supports us with a grant they receive from the Department of Health and Wellness. We are also affiliated with Action Canada for Sexual Health and Rights, through which we can access low cost condoms and lube.

Trends

By following the news, interacting with our community network, and gathering data, we are able to keep track of local trends in sexual health.

On the global front, concerning developments in the United States has led to a reduction in reproductive services for Americans, especially around abortion. While Canada supports abortion services, trends in the U.S. do concern us, especially with the development of a sexnegative provincial government in Ontario. Currently, Canadians have access to reproductive services (at least in big cities), but these services can sometimes be changed overnight when a different government takes power.

More locally, it is concerning how few supports there are for trans and gender diverse individuals. We are currently referring people to the Annapolis Valley and Halifax for these sometimes life-saving supports. Local support for mental health as well as transitioning health care needs to be improved.

We continue to field requests for primary health care. Our number seems to be a last resort for folks looking to book appointments for Pap testing, sexually transmitted infection testing, and prescriptions for contraceptives. The best we can offer them is our local walk-in clinics, which do not do Pap testing, or Halifax.

In the schools, one of the biggest issues we face is sexting and intimate images. This potentially risky activity has become a cultural norm for youth, and community partners are working to develop ways to respond to this trend that is effective and evidence-based. And, of course, our organization aims to be sex positive at the same time.

Consent continues to be a subject of interest for our school presentations, as all educators become aware of the importance of teaching consent to all grades.





Finances

Our core operating funds continue to be less than we need to operate full-time year around. We receive a little less than \$33,000 annually to keep our doors open. The government has not increased funding to Sexual Health Nova Scotia (and thus us) since 2006.

Small project grants help us offer workshops and resources to our community and we are thankful for the ongoing support of the United Way of Lunenburg County (which funds our youth presentations) and our local Community Health Boards.

The bulk of our funding goes to payroll and rent, with the remainder going to safer sex products and office supplies. We are a thrifty organization in order to maximize our charitable efforts to the community for as much of the year as possible. Unfortunately, we had to close for two months during the summer in order to balance our budget.
