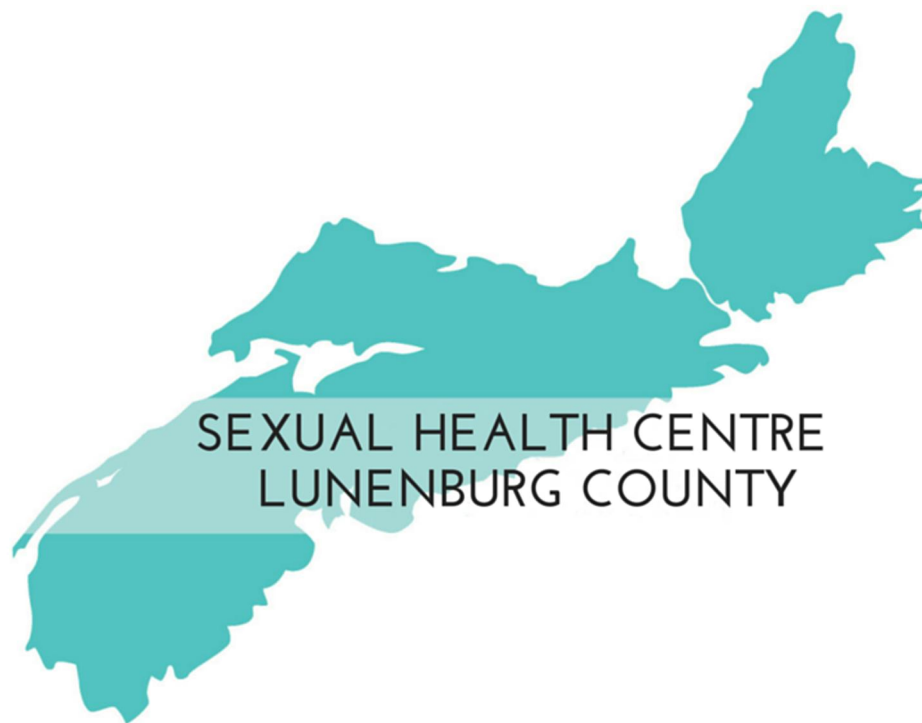

Introduction

Sexual Health Centre Lunenburg County (SHCLC) is a small charity serving Lunenburg and Queens Counties in Nova Scotia. Our mission is to promote sexual and reproductive health throughout the lifespan by providing information, education, and services, and encouraging informed, responsible attitudes toward sexuality.

Some of the services we offer everyone for free include:

- Education
- Outreach
- Pregnancy testing and options guidance
- Health supplies like condoms, dams, and lube
- Individual guidance
- Resources

Behind the scenes, this fiscal year differed from previous years. Although it is not profoundly noticeable on the front lines, the SHCLC has been supporting its parent organization, Sexual Health Nova Scotia, in becoming a strong provincial voice for sexual and reproductive health.

This support has come at the expense of some operating funds and staff time. Thankfully, we were assisted by project grants from several organizations, allowing us to improve our resources for people, parents, and professionals.

While our future continues to remain uncertain without guaranteed funding for operating costs, we keep doing the best we can to promote health and wellbeing on the South Shore.

Trends

While the core issues of sexual health remain the same—sexual violence, inequality among genders and orientations—there are numerous trends we’ve spotted this past year.

Sexting, including the sharing of intimate photos, has become a norm for our youth. Our community partners are noticing an increase of this. We are collaborating to address this issue through workshops for junior high students.

More and more people are becoming aware of **trans** health needs. People are requesting resources both to help them learn to become allies, but also to improve services for this underserved population. Unfortunately, the South Shore has few medical resources for its trans patients and many must travel to Halifax for services.

The **amalgamation of the local health authorities** into one provincial body has led to a decrease in services, especially for those who have experienced sexual violence. Previously, under Sexual Assault Services Lunenburg Queens, victims and survivors who attended emergency rooms for sexual assault, including accessing “rape kits”, were provided with immediate mental health support. This service has been discontinued on the South Shore despite positive feedback from victims and survivors.

The ongoing lack of **doctors and nurse practitioners** means we continue to see many people who are looking for basic health care like prescriptions and sexually transmitted infection (STI) testing and care. We receive many requests from folks without a primary health care provider.

Impact

Although we have seen a drop in individuals seeking our services directly at our office, we have seen an increase of professionals using our resources. Instead of making clients “come to us” we do our best to “go to them”.

We continue to distribute thousands of safer sex supplies to the community, with 18 sites giving out our condoms, dams, and lube. This includes non-profit organizations, schools, and community clinics.

As the health care system continues to offer patchwork services for sexual and reproductive health, especially in rural areas like ours, we offer vital navigation for people who are unable or unsure about accessing trans care, STI testing, affordable contraception, or abortions. Individuals and professionals call us regularly about how to get these services.

Finally, we continue to be a public face for sexual and reproductive healthcare at a time when worldwide services are at risk. Promoting positive sexuality is one of the most important things we do, whether it's highlighting the positive aspects of pleasure, or denouncing homophobia and transphobia.

Requests

As a unique organization, we get various requests for information and how to navigate the health care system. Here is a sample of what we answer:

- Where can I get tested for sexually transmitted infections?
- Can I get pregnant on my period?
- Where can I find a local doctor who is trans friendly and comfortable initiating hormone therapy?
- Can you pay for my prescription?
- How do I get free birth control?
- Can I get an abortion in Bridgewater?
- Where in Bridgewater can I get an IUD inserted?
- Where can I get cheap birth control?
- How do I get blood tests after a sexual assault?

Promotions

Thanks to the free marketing and promotional power of social media, we are able to extend our reach beyond our borders to collaborate with provincial, national, and even international supporters.

Our website continues to be a resource for anyone looking for sexual health information. This year, our summer student Katie Renner began the Sextionary, which is a page filled with definitions about sexual health. Look it up today and email us if you have any suggestions.

We also completed our first videos for Sex Talks, a series that tackles subjects ranging from Anal Sex 101 to Hypersexualization. We were delighted to get grants from the Lunenburg County Community Health Board, Queens Community Health Board, and the Sexual Violence Strategy (Department of Community Services, Nova Scotia). Already, we've had almost 500 views on our You Tube channel.

Our newsletter continues to go out to individuals and professionals. Subscribe today for all the latest in sexual health.

Finally, we also continue to cultivate a presence on social media, including Facebook, Twitter, and Instagram. Despite the size of our organization, we've managed to create 166,156 impressions on Facebook and Twitter. Our website and Twitter profile received 7,884 visits from people learning more about our organization.

Finances

The core operating funds of our organization remain tiny (\$34,000-35,000 annually), but we manage to do a lot with a little. Unfortunately, the grant we receive indirectly from the Department of Health and Wellness (channeled through Sexual Health Nova Scotia) has not increased in over a decade while the costs of doing business continue to rise.

This year, we were delighted to receive extra funding to provide support to our provincial organization, as well as grants from Canada Summer Jobs, Lunenburg County Community Health Board, Queens Community Health Board, and the Sexual Violence Strategy. We have also been able to continue using funds from the United Way of Lunenburg County to ensure we reach youth in the schools.

Most of our finances go to payroll and rent, with the remainder going to office supplies and safer sex products as well as pregnancy testing.

Needless to say, we continue to operate a fiscally conservative organization.

3. Offering Safer Spaces for LGBTQ... on the South Shore for the first time.

5. Loss of mental health component of Sexual Assault Services Lunenburg Queens.
6. Collaborating with CATIE to bring Hep C and HIV workshop to Bridgewater last October.
7. Addition of Susan Berry to our Board of Directors while saying goodbye to our legal guru Jill Skinner. Susan comes with a background in volunteering at another sexual health centre. Welcome Susan... and thanks Jill!
8. Distributing silicon lube for the first time ever.
9. Helping Sexual Health Nova Scotia revitalize itself, including hiring a Provincial Coordinator.
10. Our Valentine's/Sexual and Reproductive Health Week contest.
